<b>Florida School Board Elections Update</b>	This workshop will discuss the experiences of three first-time school board candidates in Florida. The panelists will discuss public education messaging, their interactions with educators, parents, and students, and the politics of school boards in Florida.	Knox
<b>Examining the Charter School and Privatization Movement in South Carolina's Lowcountry: How QEP Won a Battle in the Larger War on Public Education</b>	This workshop will focus upon the work of the Quality Education Project (QEP) , an organizational member of NPE in South Carolina. The current director and faculty member at the University of South Carolina and two members of QEP that serve on the local school boards in Charleston, SC will share highlights of their fight against the privatization movement in South Carolina involving Burke High School, a historic predominantly Black high school on the peninsula and the Reimagine Schools Plan. They will also share some of the strategies used at the grassroots level to win smaller battles in the larger war against public education.	Champaign

<b>The Fight for Educational Freedom: From the Criminalization of Literacy to the Banning of Ideas</b>	The panel will examine modern censorship and educational inequality through the lens of history. It connects the criminalization of black literacy and subversive literature during slavery to Jim Crow segregation, the lost cause narrative and today's anti-CRT legislation. Black people, however, resisted throughout, running secret schools during slavery, pushing for public education during Reconstruction, and ushering in the modern civil rights movement. The panel will also include detailed analysis of current legislative trends.	Madison
<b>"Vouchers Hurt! The Ohio Story: Part 2 - Winning in the Court of Public Opinion"</b>	This accomplished panel will present strategies and actions for convincing Ohioans, including local community leaders, school communities, boards of education, retired school staff, and taxpayers, that the school voucher agenda can only be eliminated if local community members across the state stand up to the legislative majority by supporting the Vouchers Hurt Ohio lawsuit. <b>The Hidden Cost of Vouchers</b>	The Economic Policy Institute has developed a tool that estimates fiscal externalities—the dollar costs to school districts from students leaving public schools with a voucher. This panel will present the fiscal externality calculator and show users how to calculate the calculator for their district. It will provide examples of impact from research as well as the operations of a school district.	Fayette
<b>Power of Community-Oriented Public Schools in Closing Opportunity Gaps</b>	Parents for Public Schools San Francisco will share successful models of community schools. Participants will learn about strategic equity enrollment approaches, navigation for student assignment systems, engaging in school governance and board meetings and in parent/community advisory groups, and developing the skills necessary for building, accessing, and navigating community support systems. <b>How to Organize a Multigenerational Community Movement to Beat Back Far Right Attacks on School Boards and Public Education</b>	This workshop will provide attendees with a toolbox of strategies and tactics on how to mobilize communities, even conservative communities, to defeat far-right insurgents in their attempt to politicize and take over school boards. Panelists will tell the story of their community, Sarasota, Florida, which became ground zero for the rightwing insurgency against public education in August 2020 when Bridget Ziegler, Sarasota school board member and co-founder of Moms for Liberty, organized a rightwing invasion of school board meetings.
